CHAIR'S WELCOME

Welcome to 'On Track', our report on progress during the past year. This year the title might be more fittingly 'Not Always On Track' since, sadly, we have had both yearlong industrial action and also the need for a campaign for the full reinstatement of the hourly service between Crewe and Nottingham. I'm pleased to say this campaign has now met with partial success with four of the six missing trains promised for reinstatement, Monday to Friday only, starting in December 2023. These include the missing peak travel time services. We continue to press for the return of all services and invite anyone wishing to support this campaign to sign our on-line petition at:

Reinstate the hourly Crewe-Stoke-Derby rail service (ipetitions.com)

Then we just need the industrial disputes to be settled to encourage passengers to return to using a regular and reliable railway service.

Our other major concern during the year has been the proposed national ticket office closure programme. We are speaking out for the many people least able to make their voices heard for whom the ticket office facility is most valuable, for some indispensable. We are particularly concerned about Kidsgrove where the 36 hours/week of staffed ticket office time may be replaced by a weekly mobile staff visit (mobile = extra travel with an unquantified carbon footprint). As well as the loss of the ticket office and the friendly staff presence, we are also concerned that this will further restrict access to many station facilities currently locked when there is no staff present as well as putting 'A Spotter Tea' at serious risk.

These are strange times since the community rail partnership is not established as a campaigning organisation, but rather a partnership working closely with the rail industry and supporting our many station volunteers in making stations more attractive and rail travel more enticing. I am pleased to say this aspect of our work has not been neglected as you will read in this report. For this I should add my thanks to all our volunteers whose work at every one of our stations has been marvellous. A particular thanks to Claire and Emma, our community rail partnership officers without whom much of what you read would not have happened.

I must end with some sad news. After six years of outstanding service Claire has announced her retirement with effect from the end of February 2024. I know I speak for all our volunteers when I say that her abilities to support their work has been superb as has her energy in initiating a host of new projects including many station improvements. I hope you have seen our updated and refreshed website which came on stream this year; another excellent development overseen by Claire.

THE VALUE OF VOLUNTEERING

We estimate that our North Staffs CRP volunteers have this year (August 2022 to July 2023) contributed 4547 hours to improving their stations. At £15 per hour this equates to **£68,205**!

STATION IMPROVEMENTS

A new mural for Uttoxeter Station

The 38m long wall at the back of Platform 1 features two fantastic new murals by local artists, Maisie Baker and We are Culla. They replace the previous mural which had deteriorated badly over the last few years. The first mural features special places in the town as selected by local people in the Your Uttoxeter postcard campaign. Those locations receiving the most mentions were the parks, Go Active Leisure Centre, Cinebowl, the historic town centre and the station. The town's friendly people and community spirit were also frequently mentioned. The second mural depicts stations between Crewe and Derby and their main visitor attractions. The mural was completed in November 2022. Many thanks to our funding partners: EMR, Cross Country, Community Rail Network, Friends of Uttoxeter Station, Uttoxeter Town Council and Uttoxeter Racecourse.

Another tired looking mural was replaced this year. A much smaller affair that Uttoxeter, we decided to tackle it ourselves using some bright colours left over from the Longton bottle kiln project. With station adopters, Jan, John, Gil, Wendy and Carol we scraped off the old paint and applied new in a style Piet Mondrian would be proud of. Finally, we applied weather proof varnish and two small notices to point toward the new passenger lifts.

Celebrating 175 Years of the Trent Valley Railway

Last year NSCRP was approached by Dave Barratt and Robin Mathams from the Trent Valley Railway (TVR) Study Group about a joint project to celebrate this milestone in the route's history. Together we produced four posters documenting the TVR, comparing then and now and Queen Victoria's visit on 21st September 1847. Late trains are nothing new – the Queen's train was delayed by 24 hours! At Stafford the train paused for 8 minutes and restarted "amidst the acclamations of those assembled and the discharge of artillery". The posters, funded by Avanti West Coast Partnership, can be seen at Stafford Station and in Atherstone Heritage Centre.

Dave and Robin also gave two fully illustrated talks about the establishing of the Trent Valley Railway Company and the building of the railway including Shugborough Tunnel. The talks were fullv booked and enjoyed by all.

buildings were demolished in 1994. The Foxfield Railway transported coal from the nearby colliery to the mainline at Blythe Bridge. This heritage railway now offers Sunday passenger services and other events between Easter and October. Many thanks to Anthony Dawson of Foxfield Railway for providing text and photos.

Station improvements at Peartree

• This Spring we were delighted to work again with sixth formers from St Martin's Academy in Derby on our Peartree Wildlife Project. We arranged for them to construct bird boxes at one of the Museum of Making's brilliant workshops, supported by expert technician, Steve Smith. Two weeks later the group took their bird boxes to the station to be attached to trees with the help of our Derbyshire Wildlife Trust team. They also created an enormous bug hotel using pallets. We thank EMR for funding this project.

Longton Ticket Office update

On a cold November's day a small group of us gained access to two of the arch spaces under Longton Station. One used to be the Ticket Office and the other was used by various businesses. Unfortunately, they are too damp to be usable as a community space. On our Facebook page we asked people to send in their memories of Longton Station before the Ticket Office closed in the 1990s. They talked about a full roof (later canopies) over the platforms; covered ramps up to the platforms; railway sidings; and the terrible damp of the ticket office, staffed by the much praised Micky Blairs.

Last year EMR installed new ticket machines at all of our Crewe to Derby stations, allowing customers to buy and collect tickets at their local station. At Longton we took the opportunity to ask for an additional live information screen to be installed with the ticket machine. This allows customers to see when the trains are due in real time without having to climb the steps up to the platforms. 50% of the project costs were funded by an EMR Community Grant.

We held two litter picks at the Longport Station woodland this year, which is unfortunately very prone to fly tipping. In January (in the snow!) we were very grateful to Middleport Matters and to Growthpoint for helping out; and to Dave Elborn, Dave Steele, Amarvir Singh and Matthew Daily-Hunt. Jonathan Gullis MP and team also managed to join us for a couple of hours. The second litter pick was held on 8 June and attended by volunteers from Network Rail and Thales. A skip was filled on each occasion. Special thanks to Mel from Thales who managed to take a car load of tyres to Big Atom in Ellesmere Port which produces several products from tyres including children's playground floors and equestrian chippings. Participants were treated to an oatcake lunch at the excellent Oatbakers Ltd on Station Street.

In October we are planning a bird box building workshop on site delivered by Staffordshire Wildlife Trust to provide more habitats for wildlife. The Thales and Network Rail volunteers are keen to come back and help again. Thank you very much for your support!

also love seeing the changing displays of children's art work in their adopted shelter on Platform 2. Many thanks to the children and the school staff who support them and to lan and Trevor who in some weeks make a second visit to the station for this project.

Thanks to funding from London Northwestern Railway the planters were installed in April and the volunteers and pupils worked together to plant them up with a wonderful assortment of plants including viper's bugloss, comfrey, rudbeckia and coneflowers. They looked magnificent!

Pupils from Year 3 at St Mark's Primary School in Stoke enjoyed a fun filled railway themed day out in May. Working with Avanti West Coast and Stoke Reads, part of the National Literacy Trust, we took 57 pupils on the Duck Bills Story Trail where they followed the map to find out lots of interesting

facts about Stoke town and the railway. The trail finished at Stoke-on-Trent Station where pupils then caught a train to Stockport Station. For many of the children it was their first time on a train. At Stockport Station they took part in lots of fun station activities delivered by Avanti station staff including train dispatch, announcing the trains and visiting the signal box. The children had a fantastic day and from their feedback I think we may have some future train announcers and signallers!

Duck Bills Brought to Life!

Following on from last year's launch of the Duck Bills Story Trail, we worked with partners Stoke Reads, B Arts and Stoke Library to put on a family event in July to bring Duck Bills "to life" through an interactive performance trail. Attendees followed tour guide, Duck Bills, from Stoke Library to Stoke-on-Trent Railway Station, finding out about the history of Stoke Town and the railway station. They met a range of characters along the way including a fictional paintress and aspiring potter working at the Spode factory in 1923 who invited them to help use slip to decorate two collaborative pots. They met a fictional Spitfire pilot from 1944 and at Stoke Minster a goose from 823 AD told them about pilgrimage routes and taught a tongue twister. At the King's Hall Duck Bills showed the group some Northern Soul dance moves! Finally, they met a train enthusiast from 1848 at Stoke-on-Trent Railway Station who talked about the opening of the station and invited attendees to play station bingo.

There was also a range of family friendly activities available at Stoke Library including Travelling by Train Rocks pebble painting, storytelling, drawing workshops and every child received a free book from Stoke Reads. Over 60 children attended the library event and 22 adults and 38 children took part in the guided story trail.

Crewe Station Celebrates 185th Anniversary

2022 saw the 185th anniversary of the first train to pass through Crewe and to celebrate we held a number of events with Avanti West Coast and the Crewe to Manchester Community Rail Partnership. There was a special guided tour of Crewe Station where attendees learnt about the station's history including how the station has changed through the years, the locomotive works, Royal Mail trains, the Crewe Arms Hotel and The Great Train Robbery! There was a talk by our Chair, Michael Willmot, on the History of Social and Technological Advancements Told Through Railway Art and a Big Draw event at Crewe Heritage Centre.

Sherborne Community Project

This year was the second year of funding from Avanti West Coast for the Sherborne Community Project in Crewe. The Project provides a local community hub and a range of activities including a children's gardening group and an adult peer support group. Working with Avanti and the Sherborne Project we supported a number of families in visiting Crewe Station where the children

learnt about how the station works, how trains are dispatched and, their highlight of the visit, they got to announce a train! In April we accompanied them on a try-the-train trip to Llandudno where they were able to spend time at the beach and at the Victorian Extravaganza enjoying the fairground rides thanks to Conwy Valley Community Rail Partnership.

Penkridge History Project

In July, pupils from Wolgarston High School took part in a guided Rails to Trails walk around Penkridge to learn about the history of the village. Penkridge Heritage Centre kindly opened up for us so pupils had a chance to look around the building, the reconstructed prison cell and to view the old documents and photos on display. Being put in the stocks at the front of the building was a definite hit! After completing the trail pupils returned to school and took part in a poetry workshop, funded by London Northwestern Railway, to produce a group poem about Penkridge's history which will go on display at Penkridge Station.
