



CHAIR'S WELCOME

A warm welcome to 'On Track', our report on progress during the past year - and I'd like to begin by thanking everyone who has helped the North Staffs CRP in any way during the year – we depend so much on each other's efforts to achieve our overall aims!

As you may have read in our last issue, Claire Sandys, who along with Emma McIntosh, was one of our two Community Rail Partnership Officers, had announced that she intended to retire with effect from the end of February 2024. In the event, it proved much harder than anticipated to replace her, so both she and also our outgoing Chair, Mike Willmot, stayed on (for quite some time) until we had achieved this. I'm very pleased to be able to report that Sam Burton Smith has now been appointed as our new Community Rail Partnership Officer, working alongside Emma, who has greatly helped in smoothing the transition process. I'd also like to sincerely thank both Mike and Claire at this point for volunteering to stay on significantly longer than they had intended and helping us to successfully begin a new era for the CRP. We've also received strong support from CRN (Paul Webster) and EMR (Alexa Stott) with the recruitment process – thank you both for your help and advice.

With both a background and strong interest in public transport, Sam is a real asset and very approachable – I'm sure that you will make him welcome if you've yet to meet him.

As Mike departs for pastures new, my former role as Chair Elect has also now changed – and I'm beginning to become used to the challenges of being your Chair. I hope to continue to visit various ongoing projects and am looking forward to seeing more of you throughout the coming year.

Moving to other matters; whilst industrial unrest in the rail industry is still yet to be fully reconciled, some of our other issues of concern last year have been resolved. In terms of the full reinstatement of the hourly service between Crewe and Nottingham, the great news is that this will be achieved with effect from the December 2024 timetable changes, as EMR have very recently confirmed the reintroduction / extension of four weekday services and six Saturday services.

Our other major concern during the year was the proposed national ticket office closure programme. However, due to the national consultation exercise resulting in a very significant amount of criticism of the proposals, you will no doubt be aware that they were cancelled and (thankfully) will not be implemented. It should be noted that Kidsgrove (where we were concerned at the potential loss of facilities) produced a number of consultation responses well in excess of its size – the numbers were similar to those from the main stations, such as Nottingham & Leicester. Thanks to everyone who provided supportive responses – it demonstrates that democracy can still work!

I hope that you enjoy reading the rest of this issue, which details some of the work and projects that we have been involved with delivering during the past year. In line with our remit, we continue to work in partnership with the various train operating companies and support our many station volunteers in making our stations more attractive and rail travel more enticing.

THE VALUE OF VOLUNTEERING

We estimate that North Staffs CRP volunteers have contributed 4345 hours to improving their stations and engaging in community activities this year (August 2023 to July 2024). At £15 per hour this equates to **£65,175**!



STATION IMPROVEMENTS

Bee Friendly Cub Scouts

We had a great time working with the 12th Burton, 1st Tutbury and Hatton Cub Scouts. During their first group visit to the station in June they learnt about bees from Dr Luke Dixon of the Bee Friendly Trust and went on a rail safety walk with Claire. Back at HQ, the scouts drew their artwork on the theme of bees and other insect pollinators, followed by an appropriate snack of bread and honey.

In September, the artwork was designed into two fabulous banners for the station's Bee Friendly Garden. The children were delighted to see their creations on display for everyone to see.

Crewe Poetry Mural

The overbridge at Crewe Station is now home to a large mural featuring a poem by local poet Gareth Williams, titled The Tracks are our Veins, which celebrates Crewe's railway heritage. The mural, funded by Avanti West Coast, is a legacy project following on from the 185th anniversary of the first train to pass through Crewe and makes a fabulous statement; displaying artwork featuring local places of interest.

Crewe Station Gallery Wall and School Poetry Project

With funding from Avanti West Coast, the waiting room on Platform 5 at Crewe Station is now sporting a large gallery wall that will be used to display artwork from community groups and schools. The first works on display are a series of poems from pupils at Brierley Primary School, Edleston Primary School and Springfields School about travelling by train.

The poems were created by pupils at the schools following a Community Rail Network funded project that saw poet Gareth Williams deliver six workshops in the schools. In addition, Gareth created a poem using an *'experience capture'* approach at Crewe Heritage Centre.

Industry Partner Volunteers Build Birdboxes for Local Woodland

In October, volunteers from Thales, Network Rail and Longport Station generously gave their time to nature when they built and installed 16 bird boxes at the woodland adjacent to Longport Station. Staffordshire Wildlife Trust provided kits and instructions for assembly, which was harder than it looked! They also did some litter picking around the site before sampling (some for the first time) a very well-deserved Staffordshire Oatcake.

New Planters in the Derby Station Garden

Thanks to a Community Engagement Fund grant from CrossCountry, we have been able to create and fill five large wooden trough planters at the front of the station. These were built from railway sleepers by East Midlands Railway's wonderful Station Service Technicians, Neil and Kev. Tracsis volunteers, the new EMR station adopters at Derby, then filled the planters with compost and planted them up with colourful and fragrant flowering plants to enhance the environment for passengers and pollinators. We hope that these will provide an improved welcome to the city of Derby.

Stone Station Projects

Stone Station has benefited from two new planters which are showcasing a wonderful display of pollinator friendly flowers. The flowers were selected by a community vote and they look magnificent! Over 100 people joined North Staffordshire Community Rail Partnership (CRP) and volunteers at Stone Station in March for a Community Open Day celebrating the work of the station volunteers and the recent station improvement projects.

Clients from Futures2gether provided a pop-up café offering refreshments, the Bumblebee Conservation Trust offered seed bomb making activities, AEDdonate provided first aid demonstrations, pupils from St Dominic's Priory School entertained with their spring themed poems and we gave a guided '*Rails to Trails*' walk from Stone Station into Stone Town. The event was also attended by West Midlands Trains, Network Rail, Stone Town Council and North Staffs Rail Promotion Group.

The feedback from those attending was very positive with great appreciation for the work at the station and in particular the spectacular planting displays! The first Community Day was so well received that we held a further "mini" event in August that was attend by 50 people.



SCHOOL ENGAGEMENT

World Book Day

PARTIAL REINSTATEMENT OF THE CREWE – STOKE – DERBY HOURLY SERVICE

In the December 2023 timetable change we were delighted to see a partial reinstatement of the hourly service between Crewe and Derby. This was thanks to a joint campaign with East Midlands Railway, aided by local MPs. We welcomed back five services per day to our stations on weekdays only. Claire interviewed passengers on the reinstated trains during a couple of days in December and January to find out their response and they were overwhelmingly positive about the additional trains. We are also pleased to announce that from the December 2024 timetable change, an additional service in each direction will operate on weekdays, and three additional services in each direction will operate on Saturdays. This constitutes the full restoration of the hourly EMR service between Derby and Crewe, between 6am and 10pm.
